Summer Safety

Please apply sun-cream to your child before they start school each day and send them in with a sun hat or cap to wear at playtimes.

Hair-cuts – please ensure no shaved cuts or patterned shaving styles please – save these for the start of the summer holiday.



Head Lice

Please continue to be vigilant and check your child's head on a regular basis for head live or nits. Combing your child's hair once a week with a nit comb and conditioner will help keep these pests at bay. Loose hair is more likely to make a child prone to picking up head lice – it is best to tie long hair back to reduce this likelihood.










. The school supports my child's spiritual development (liturgies, prayer space, masses, RE, music, values led curriculum).




Again, please if you are unsure about how we support your child please talk to your child's class teacher or ask at the office and they will signpost you to the relevant support.






June is the month of '30 days wild' – a wildlife focus run by The Wildlife Trusts ... just search the internet for this page:
