Dear Parents and Carers,

We have had such extremes of weather this week – spring sunshine and cold icy wind - at the start of this week the children enjoyed the sunshine and being free from their coats and then this Thursday and Friday they have felt the chill again. Please ensure they continue to bring a coat to school next week!

Uniform: Just a reminder that after the Easter holidays, the children are welcome to return in the summer uniform. The summer dresses need to be pink (not red) gingham. Children can wear white socks with summer dresses in the summer term. Please remember that any hair bands and hair accessories need to be in school colours. Children may continue to wear their winter uniform throughout the summer term if they prefer.

Covid Cases

This week there have been 11 cases.

COVID-19 Safety Measures - April 2022

We are following Government advice and will be guided by tour Trust and BCP. Our priority continues to be the safety and wellbeing of pupils and staff within our community. We will be using a common-sense approach to 'Living with Covid19' and many of our control measures will remain in place. These include all hygiene and cleaning regimes, ventilation of learning spaces and promoting awareness of the symptoms of Covid-19.

The three key symptoms of Covid-19 are recent onset of any of the following:

- A new continuous cough
- A high temperature
- A loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell

We recognise that access to Covid-19 testing is becoming increasingly restricted, and will become chargeable in some instances, as a result it may not always be possible to identify cases of covid-19. We will therefore take the following approach to illness:

Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature will be asked to stay at
home and avoid contact with other people. Government guidance states that "they can go back to
school, college or childcare when they no longer have a high temperature, and they are well
enough to attend".

- People with symptoms of a respiratory infection, including Covid-19, and a high temperature or
 who feel unwell, will be asked to stay at home and avoid contact with other people, until they feel
 well enough to resume normal activities and they no longer have a high temperature.
- Anyone with a positive Covid-19 test result will be asked to avoid contact with other people for five days, which is when they are most infectious (although it should be noted that free testing for the general public will end on 1st April).



Next Sunday is Palm Sunday 10th April 2022.

Fr Chacko and Fr Babu would like to invite children to be part of the procession that will take place at the beginning of Mass. The day is called both "Palm Sunday" and "Passion Sunday."

The first name comes from the fact that it commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, when the crowd had palm branches (John 12:13).

The second name comes from the fact that the narrative of the Passion is read on this Sunday (it otherwise wouldn't be read on a Sunday, since the next Sunday is about the Resurrection).

Palm Sunday - April 10th, 2022

Holy Day of Obligation

Palm Sunday is the final Sunday of Lent, the beginning of Holy Week, and commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem, days before he was crucified.

Palm Sunday is known as such because the faithful will often receive palm fronds which they use to participate in the re-enactment of Christ's arrival in Jerusalem. In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw clothes, or possibly palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage. This was a customary practice for people of great respect.

Palm branches are widely recognized symbol of peace and victory, hence their preferred use on Palm Sunday.

The use of a donkey instead of a horse is highly symbolic, it represents the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a steed in war.

A week later, Christ would rise from the dead on the first Easter.

During Palm Sunday Mass, palms are distributed to parishioners who carry them in a ritual procession into church. The palms are blessed and many people will fashion them into small crosses or other items of personal devotion. These may be returned to the church, or kept for the year.
