Dear Parents,

Another week is over and we are nearly at the end of the first week of Lockdown. The children have settled back into school and are happy to be back with their friends and teachers.

COVID-19 Risk Assessment

Ventilation is a key part of our control measures and this will not change as the weather gets cooler. We will ensure that every room as a flow of air as this helps mitigate the risk of spreading viruses indoors. Since the room temperatures are now cooler please ensure your child wears several layers – we suggest an under vest below their shirt and also an additional cardigan or fleece over their school jumper. This should be in addition to their outdoor coat, hat and gloves. We do not want children to feel uncomfortable and **extra clothing** with help to keep them motivated.

If your child or a member of your household becomes **symptomatic of COVID-19**, please follow the Government guidelines and apply for a test. Please inform the school that you are symptomatic and inform the school of the outcome of the test. If you have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive, then you must follow the Government guidance on self-isolation to protect others in the community.

Control measures in school are frequently reviewed and all staff, parents and pupils must comply. I am sure that you have already read the much anticipated Government COVID-19 Update following last Thursday's announcements (guidance).

Clinically extremely vulnerable - children

- Children whose doctors have confirmed they are still clinically extremely vulnerable are
 advised not to attend education whilst the national restrictions (Lockdown) are in
 place. Appropriate arrangements for remote education will be made.
- Parents of clinically extremely vulnerable children should receive a letter shortly confirming this advice from an NHS specialist.
- Children who live with someone who is clinically extremely vulnerable, but who are not clinically extremely vulnerable themselves, should still attend education.

Most children originally identified as clinically extremely vulnerable are no longer identified as such. We encourage parents to speak to their GP or specialist clinician, as soon as possible, if they have not already done so, to understand whether your child should still be classed as clinically extremely vulnerable.

Clinically vulnerable staff and children

 Children who are <u>clinically vulnerable</u> or have <u>underlying health conditions</u> but are not clinically extremely vulnerable, should continue to attend school in line with current guidance.

Remote Learning at Christ the King School

TT Rockstars KS2 Competition



As part of our commitment to make maths exciting and high profile in our school, this November we are taking part in a competition for Maths Week England. It's called Rock Out 2020 and it's all done online via play.ttrockstars.com. For every correct answer to a multiplication or division question, your child will earn their class a point. The Times Tables Rock Stars platform will calculate the class average (the number of correct answers per pupil in the class who play during the competition hours). Winning classes in the school and in the country as a whole will be the ones with the highest average. All game modes (Gig, Garage, Studio, etc.) will count but only from games played between 7.30am and 7.30pm on Monday 9^{th,} Tuesday 10th, Wednesday 11th, Thursday 12th, Friday 13th and Saturday 14th. In the spirit of the competition, please don't play on their behalf but by all means encourage and support them to the extent that it doesn't cause high stress levels or impact on family plans. We suggest a limit of half an hour a day outside school hours – some will play more, some will play less. Thanks for your support.

RHE (Relationships and Health Education)

Only one adult per family is allowed on site to drop off or pick up pupils – this includes NO older siblings as we are actively trying to reduce the number of persons on site and ensure these routines are fluid.

Please ensure that the flow of foot traffic on the back and front school pathways is not hindered by stopping to talk on pathways to friends or other parents – foot traffic should flow at all time and must be **single file** – walking **on the left** please.
