Dear Parents and Carers,

Thank you to all parents who took the time to complete our school questionnaire. We are overwhelmed with the positive response - 132 responses is a record! We will consider the results very carefully in order to continue improving our school. We are not complacent and believe that your feedback and feedback from the pupils will help leaders and staff to strive to provide the best service we can to our community.

Overall 92% of parents who responded are happy with their child's experience at Christ the King School, 4% disagree that they receive a good education and 4% are unsure. The majority of parents would like the focus on pupil wellbeing post lockdown to continue and are anxious about government expectations for catch up. In terms of strengths and areas for development of the school there are some common themes in the responses. Many parents view communication as a strength of the school whilst a few felt this could still be improved, specifically communication of their child's progress. Many parents also feel that the Catholic Life of the school is strong, whilst the most frequent area to develop is more access to after school activities. We are certainly planning next term to reintroduce visits to our church for masses and to start up the many clubs that have been absent due to the pandemic.

Judaism Visit


Thank you to PTFA for funding this virtual visit. The children have enjoyed learning about the Jewish faith and making comparisons with other world faiths, including Christianity.






It was lovely to have girls' football training starting up again today- thanks Mr Hancox!

St George


